

- Increase the number of declared horses in training from 135 to 250 by 2021.

A Vision For Epsom

Epsom is synonymous with horseracing and the greatest flat race in the world - The Derby.

The Derby is:

- Over 200 years old.
- One of the UK's top ten attended annual sporting events.

Epsom racecourse employs 40 full-time – and hundreds of part-time – staff, making a major contribution to the local economy. In addition, the local racehorse training industry adds a further £13 million annually. Yet the Epsom racehorse training industry is hanging by a thread.

This "Vision for Epsom" aims to turn around the current decline and make Epsom a "Globally Recognised 21st Century Centre of Excellence for the Horseracing Industry."

Horses In Training In Epsom Area



The decline in training yards and horses-in-training has been driven by increasing urbanisation around the Downs through demand for residential property in a highly desirable area so close to London. In recent years, 28 racing yards have been lost to lucrative residential development.

We have started to reverse this decline, with a target of 250 horses in training by 2021, from the present figure of 135 horses.

The Strengths Of Epsom

- A horseracing history and heritage unmatched anywhere in the world.
- Proximity to London which offers huge opportunities in attracting new owners.
- Proximity to key racecourses which makes it a great location to train.
- Dedicated local partners working together to create a great competitive advantage for the area.

Investing In The Future

To create momentum we have brought together all of the representatives of the British Horseracing Authority, the Jockey Club, the Training Ground Management Board and the Epsom Trainers Association.

The Jockey Club is investing £200,000 in improvements to the training grounds on the Downs. We are developing a new partnership with Surrey University and we are looking to partner with other local stakeholders.

Our Plan

1. Secure The Future

Securing permissions for the development of South Hatch Stables, Downs House and Langley Vale Farm are core to reversing the decline of racehorse training in Epsom.

2. A Global Centre For Horseracing Innovation

We are working with Surrey University to develop proposals for a Global Centre for Digital Innovation in horseracing at Epsom — with world leading innovation for equine science and racehorse training delivering employment, investment and competitive advantage.

3. Ownership

We need to create a compelling vision for new owners to have their horses at Epsom. We are working on developing syndicates targeted at people in the Epsom area, South-West London & the City.



4. The Future Of The Downs

We will work with partners to conserve and develop the Downs for the local community — working together with organisations like the Woodland Trust, who are planting more than 200,000 trees at Langley Woodland — and create a "racing zone" which will protect some of the key facilities for horse training in the area.

5. Future Ambitions

We will work across the horseracing industry and the wider community to identify further appropriate projects which will help us deliver our vision.
